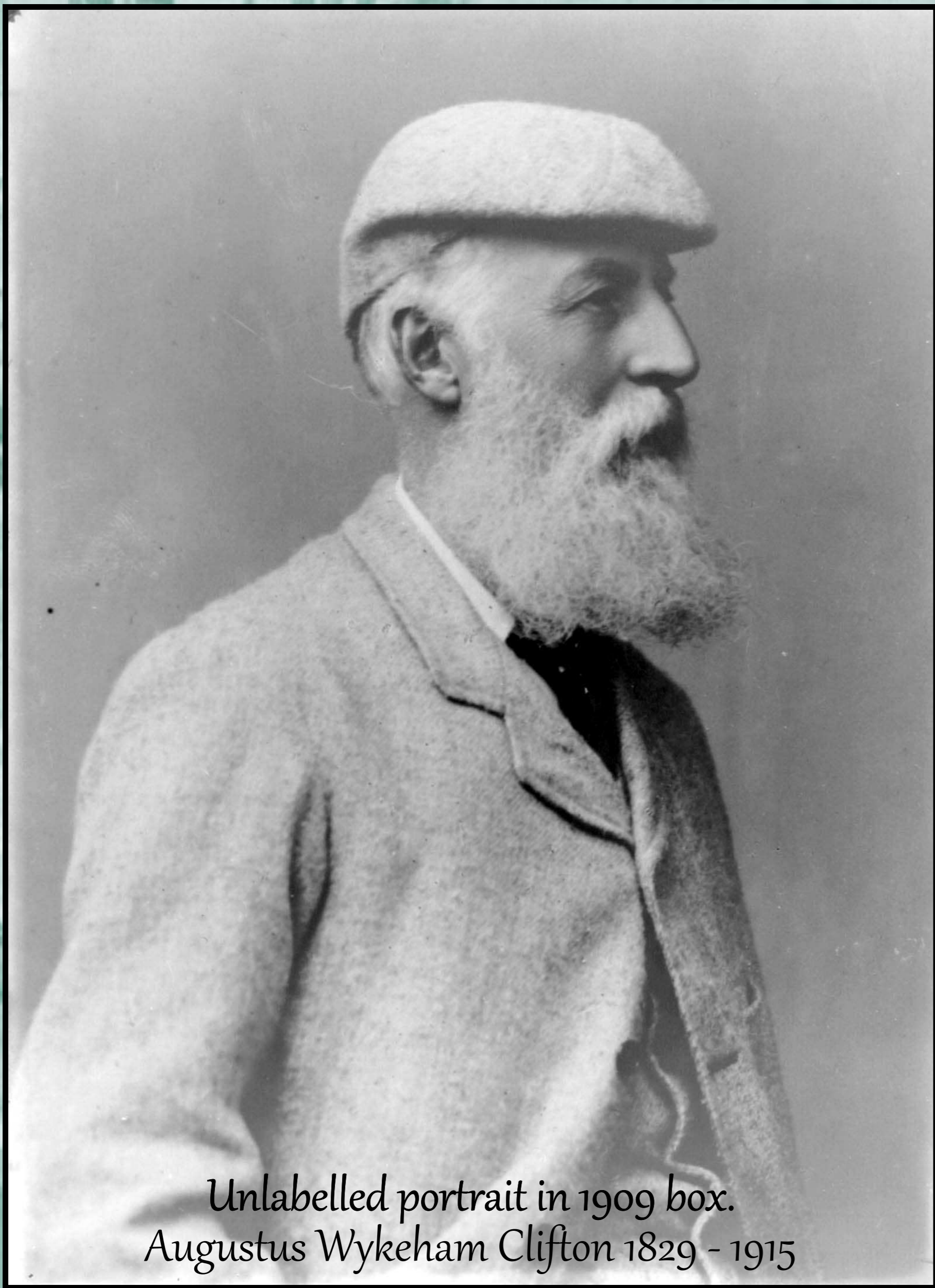

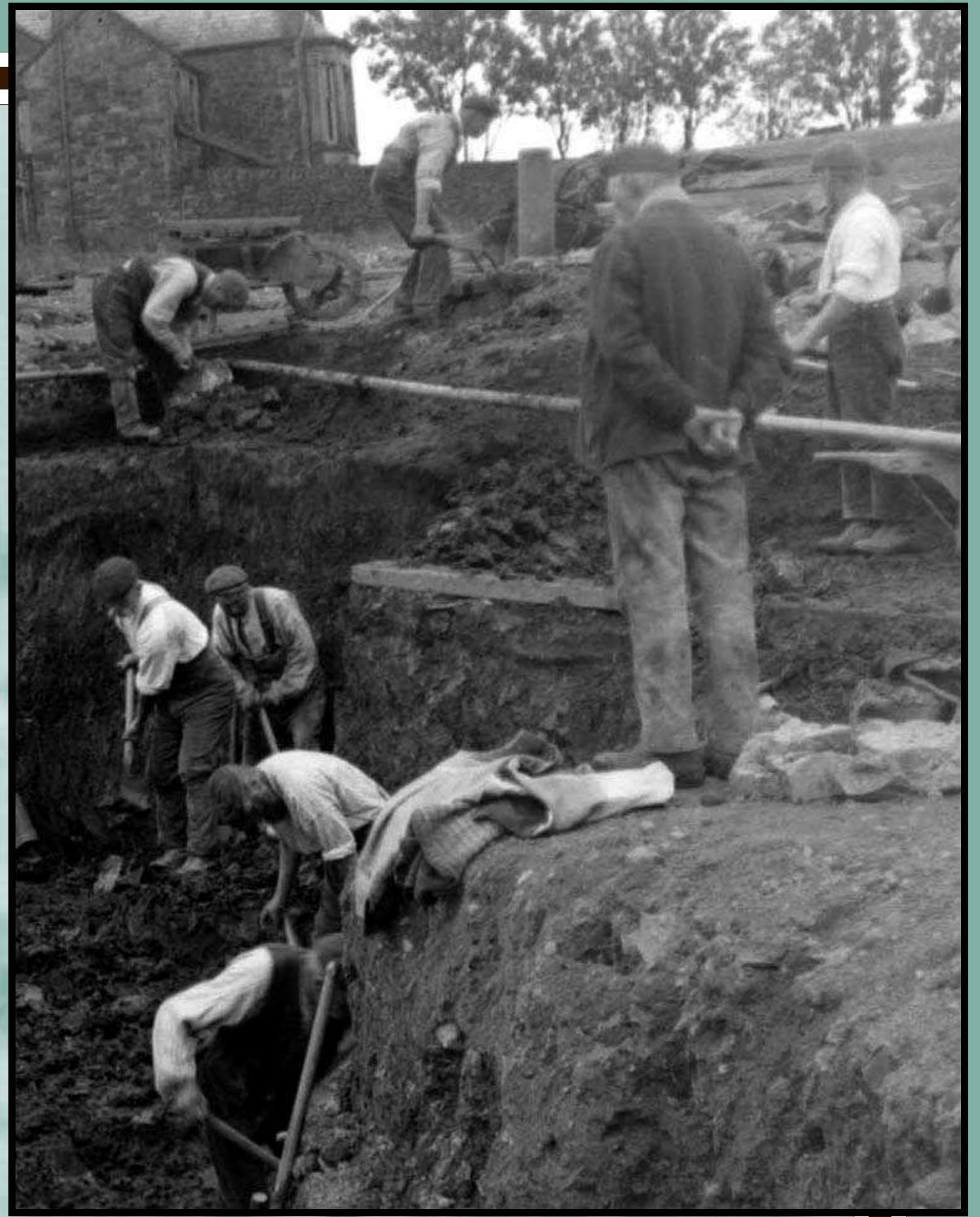
The man with his hands behind his back seems to be supervising the construction in this photo of 1909 ...

But perhaps this obituary from the Preston Guardian in 1916 solves the mystery ...

THE LATE Mr. C. J. ROBINSON – The interment took place at St. John's Calder Vale, of Mr. Christopher John Robinson, late of Reservoir House, Barnacre. Deceased who was 65 years of age, died at the residence of his niece, 54, Dallas-street, Preston on August 23rd. A native of Barnacre, he spent his childhood at Burns Farm, Barnacre. His first appointment was as an inspector under the Fylde Water Board and he was placed in charge of



the reservoir at Barnacre which is now little used. When the three new reservoirs were built he was given charge of them and resided at Reservoir House. For 45 years he remained in the employment of the Board, retiring nine months ago owing to ill health, and going to reside with his niece Mrs. Johnson, first at Forton, and later at Dallas-street, Preston. With the exception of the nine months he spent the whole of his lifetime in Barnacre. His grandfather and also his father resided in the same neighbourhood for many years. The latter died ten years ago and is buried at Calder Vale. Of a retiring disposition, deceased took no active part in public affairs but seemed to make his work a lifetime hobby. He was a member of the Adelaide Lodge (Garstang) of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows and was well-known and highly respected by a large circle of friends. Deceased had been ill for about 12 months. His wife died about nine years ago, and his brother Mr. W. Robinson of Haworth Farm Barnacre, who was a well-known cattle dealer, died 12 months ago. Deceased leaves four sons and one daughter. The eldest son lives at Barnacre, two others are in Canada, and the fourth is in the Orkney Islands. The daughter resides at Lancaster. The Rev. G. H. Wilson officiated at the funeral, and the four oldest employees of the Fylde Water Board acted as bearers. The chief mourners were relatives of the deceased, and there were numerous floral tributes, including a wreath from his former employers.
